## Implementation Strategy as at January 2014

### Principle 1: Reduce the use of natural resources

- All organisational documentation is maintained electronically – implemented July 2011
- Preferred form of communication is electronic – January 2011
- All course material including references are available electronically – implemented April 2012

### Principle 2: Enable quality education without the need for significant travel

This principle impacts both how our courses are designed and delivered, but also how the organization operates.

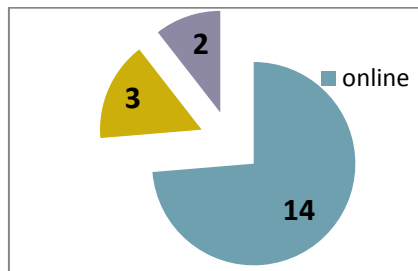
- Courses are made available online or delivered face to face with online support. eHealth Education supports eLearning and the reduction of the need to travel for education by making course material available electronically. This includes all policy documents related to organisational practice, student administration, plagiarism etc required to administer a quality educational program and support students.

## Principle 3: Engage with educational and eHealth authorities to encourage and support sustainable quality approaches to education.

- Members of eHealth Education staff participate in Professional and Industry Association organisations to support improved practices in education delivery.
- Reduce travel for meetings and administration or student support through the use of technology
  - Regular teleconferences facilities and eLearning facilities are used for:
    - Course Development meetings
    - Academic Board and Board of Management meetings (Face to Face meetings occurring yearly).
    - Student support is available 7 days a week through online web based tutor support when required by students.

## Principle 4: Recycle

- Where paper is produced we prefer using recycled paper, and we print on both sides of paper where ever practical – Actioned January 2012
- All paper refuse produced will be recycled – Actioned January 2011

## Principle 5: Continual improvement and evaluation

Yearly review of this policy and the extent to which the principles and strategies employed are effective in maintaining and improving the environmental sustainability of the organisations business approach and that of the students who complete our courses is undertaken by the Management Board of eHealth Education.
